- Let your parents know all your plans ahead of time. This includes providing them with your date's cell phone number and the location and number of any after-prom parties you may be attending.
- Stay with a group of friends throughout the night and watch each other's backs. The more the merrier...and the safer!

- •Make sure your cell phone is charged before you leave home, and keep it on all night.
- Everyone traveling by car should wear their seat belt, and not distract the driver from concentrating on the road.
- Don't drink or use drugs and drive, or let your friends!
- Take extra money with you, in case you need to call a cab for a safe ride home or an emergency arises.
- Don't leave your possessions unattended.
- Know the warning signs for alcohol poisoning and call 911 immediately if you see someone exhibiting them! Vomiting, slow breathing, unconsciousness, pale blue skin and/

or seizures are all common signs of alcohol poisioning which can quickly lead to death without treatment.

Prom night doesn't have to end at the stroke of midnight. Share these afterprom ideas with your parents and friends for safe ways to extend the fun.

- Grab lots of attention by going to a late night or all night diner for burgers and fries!
- Ask a parent to host an after-prom breakfast for the gang.
- Recap the night the next day with movies, munchies and memories.

The decisions you make on prom night can change your life, so party responsibly, and take care of yourself and your friends!

A date gone wrong

n a cool spring evening inside an unfamiliar apartment, anxiety grew in my chest as my date insisted he would not take me home. His breath was thick and rank with alcohol.

I felt tense and sick because I knew he had not drank anything while he was with me. Yet, his mood had suddenly changed.

As he stalked around the room, I could tell something bad was about to happen... I headed for the door. Seconds later, my feet were swept from beneath me. Time, as I knew it, came to a halt.

My body felt as if it had been slammed with incredible force, and I could not catch my breath. Every movement seemed to be in slow motion. I felt physically exhausted. His hands stung as he began to tear at my hair and clothes.

My cries and screams seemed inaudible, and I suffered painful repercussions for my resistance. All of a sudden his hands cut off my ability to

cry and breathe, and I was jolted to the harsh reality that I might die.

Transparent curtains of smoke began to cover my eyes. I felt complacent, although somber. A bright light seemed to overwhelm the room.

I could hear myself choking, I could feel his fingers groping at my clothes. And I could see his eyes following the work of his free hand to undo my pants. It was then that my will to live and to fight returned.

I lay still for a moment. Then with all my might I swung a free hand at a sensitive spot beneath his jaw. I ran from the apartment, but I had no cell phone, no idea where I was and there was no one in sight. I slid underneath a car in the parking lot and hid.

Within minutes he was walking through the parking lot in search of me. My thoughts were abruptly interrupted by an overpowering awareness of fear. It must have been suppressed during the incident, but fear was now shaking my body. My jaws chattered, my legs

thrashed about and my hands clinched each other.

When he decided to go back in his apartment, I ran in the road. Miraculously, a police car passed.

I cannot think of another moment so haunting as this. In the months that followed, police reports, attorney interviews and recounts of the event to family and close friends were difficult. I cannot help but chastise myself for being so trustful, even when my gut instinct told me I WAS NOT SAFE.

If I had remembered the following things, I believe I never would have been in that situation. I hope other girls can learn from my experience:

• Do not go out on a date alone with a guy you do not know well. That cute guy you pass in the halls

is not someone you know extremely well!

- Never go anywhere without a cell phone. Even if it doesn't have service, it can be used to call 911 if the battery is charged.
- Always know your location and keep your parents or a friend updated where you are throughout the evening.
- Trust your instincts! If it doesn't feel right, leave immediately!

It may have been a dreadful night for me, but I will never regret that experience. A little of that fear follows me everyday, and I believe it keeps me safe.

I will never again be so naïve as to think I am invincible. I will never again be so trusting. And, hopefully, I will never again be exposed to this kind of anger and violence.

Think before you drink

om night is coming up soon and you have big plans!
Whatever you are doing to make prom night your best ever, think twice before participating in drinking activities if you are under 21.


Have you heard of Zero Tolerance? In the state of Georgia it is illegal for a person under the age of 21 to drive a vehicle with a blood alcohol level (BAL) of 0.02 or higher. If you are caught, you will be arrested for DUI and Minor-in-Possession. Your license will be suspended for a year, you will have to perform many hours of community service and be forced to pay hundreds of dollars in fines. Not to mention what will happen when you use your one phone call to phone

your folks from jail.

Also be aware that if you drive under the influence of alcohol or other drugs, you are not only putting your life in danger, but the lives of those around you. According to the Governor's Office of Highway Safety, one out of three crash deaths in Georgia involves alcohol.

Think twice before wasting your money on a fake ID. It is illegal for an underage person to use a fraudulent ID. If caught, you face a driver's license suspension, probation, community service hours and a hefty fine.

It is possible to have a great prom and be safe too. Think about your safety and the safety of others and live to enjoy prom night 2006!

Why are these students committed to your safety? Because crime can, and does, happen anywhere to anyone.


Did you know you are twice as likely to be raped or sexually assaulted by someone you know instead of a stranger hiding in the bushes?

- 1. FALSE If you are under 21 there is a zero tolerance policy for the state of Georgia. This means you are under 21 and convicted of opertating a motor vehicle with a BAL of .02 grams or higher, you can lose your Driver's License for 12 months on the first offense.
- 2. FALSE Someone is killed every 30 minutes in an alcohol-related crash.
- 3. FALSE Encouraging the semiconscious person to vomit could cause choking and/or aspiration.
- 4. TRUE
- 5. TRUE AND FALSE Alcohol decreases your inhibitions, which factor into an increased sexual drive. However, alcohol decreases sexual functioning and is linked to the reduction of the male hormone testosterone.
- 6. FALSE According to the Governor's Office of Highway Safety, one in five crashes, involving drivers ages 16-17, had the highest rate of motor vehicle fatalities in 2000.
- 7. FALSE NEVER LEAVE AN INTOXICATED PERSON ALONE. Stay with the person and frequently assess them for alcohol poisoning.
